These mails carry attachments titled Price, Joke, with an extension of .exe, .scr, .com and .cpl.</p> <p>Bagle.AS looks for e-mail addresses from the local disk and then uses own SMTP engine to blast infections. The messages sent out have spoofed sender address with domains such as @hotmail, @msn, @Microsoft, kspadmin, cafee and so on.</p> <p>The worm locates the folders containing "shar" and copies itself on the user's systems, posing as a software installed on the machine. This variant of Bagle listens on TCP Port 81 and a UDP port.</p> <p>MicroWorld has issued warning to Net users to notice suspicious files on their systems, as the worm once downloaded on the system would terminate the security applications.
